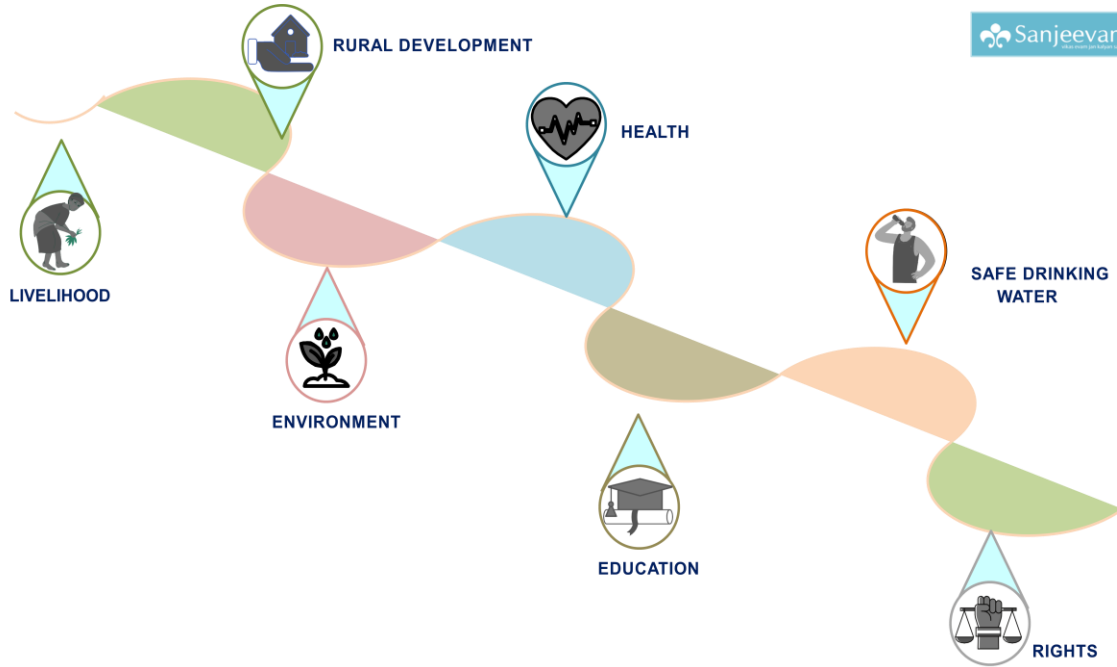

Our Focus Areas and Achievements

Sanjeevani has notable achievements based on our thematic areas which are listed below;

Rural Development, Livelihood and Skill Development and Leadership Development

- HDFC Bank CSR has collaborated with Sanjeevani and began the project in creating horticulture value addition for small apple growers and Vegetable farmers with integrated development approach of the selected villages in the development Block of Seraj, district Mandi in the state of Himachal Pradesh” for 2000 apple growers and small and marginalized vegetable farmers
- Rural development has been focused through integrated approach through the participation of people. We have collaborated with corporate as part of CSR initiatives. We have shown great results for the community. Currently, 5 villages are adopted for the integrated development of the villages.
- In livelihood, we have emphasized modern techniques of agriculture and horticulture, Organic agriculture, cash crops and others. We have collaborated with NABARD, Banks and other financial institutions for business start up initiatives. Sanjeevani also works on livelihood option for vulnerable section and persons with disabilities. We have formed 370 community based organization and 4 Disable people organizations in the Uttarakhand. We also have formed 240 SHG group members for livelihood and small business activities. We have catered the livelihood initiatives to 28000 farmers. We have formed 50 farmers’ groups and 5 farmers’ producers’ organizations.
- The Donkey Sanctuary’s organization has collaborated with Sanjeevani for undertaking a project for mule care and their families through promoting Azolla cultivation as alternative supplement for mules as well as supports the families with the supply for rations. Based on the objectives and goals, the project implementation was initiated in the field. Sanjeevani has carried out the project activities such as conducting baseline survey of all 500 equine owners, group formation of owners for activities such as Azolla cultivation and network meeting with the local veterinary hospitals, trainings on Azolla cultivation and a network meeting with local veterinary hospital were also conducted.
- As livelihood and skill development activities, we have provided skills to unemployed/uneducated youth various skills in linking them with local skill training academy which is certified by government.
- We are also continually working on financial literacy campaign in the districts of Uttarakhand.

- Sanjeevani has executed The Hunger Project in development block Takula, district Almora (Uttarakhand). This project aims to support everyelected woman Representatives on PRIs mechanism, capacity building and leadership development. We are working 51 Gram Panchayats with 268 Elected Women Ward Representatives.
- We have associated with Bahudeshiya Viklang Jan Foundation (BVJF), a network of NGOs and persons with disabilities. This is a PAN India organization. We are working on connecting all small organizations who are working on disability and inclusive development of disabled persons.

Education:

- Sanjeevani established one school namely Rajput Convent School. In Present context, class LKG to class 8th is running in the school. The main objective of the school is to impart a good and modern education to local kids in reasonable prices with modern techniques.
- In the past, in association with Department of Science and Technology, Government of India, New Delhi, we have accomplished the program in imparting the knowledge on science and technology in the government schools. We also organized national Science congress program to facilitate this program. There were nearly about 1500 students participated in these initiatives.
- In education, we have worked on Community Based Inclusive Development Initiatives (Children with Disabilities)/Child with special needs. The objective is to increase accessibility to education for children with disabilities; developing communities for inclusion and provision of specific services for persons with disabilities where required.
- Shiv Nadar Foundation and HCL have signed an MoU with Sanjeevani for Vidya Gyan Program. Meritorious students from rural and urban, economically underprivileged communities who fulfill the eligibility criteria at Vidya Gyan-one of India's top residential schools established under the aegis of Shiv Nadar Foundation and HCL. With this, 6 children have selected.

Health, Hygiene and Sanitation:

Sanjeevani has undertaken various projects in health care initiatives which are briefed as listed below;

- We have worked with Uttarakhand Jal Sansthan Ranikhet for total Sanitation Campaign Project. The main aim of the programme is to ake hundred per cent sanitation in targeted gram panchayats. After getting hundred per cent sanitation there was a provision for getting Nirmal Gram Award. We made two grampanchyats Nirmal Gram. One Gram Panchayat is Dalmori from Development Block Bhikyasen and another ChekKelani from Syaldey development block. Both gram panchayats

already awarded with Nirmal Gram Award by then Hon. President of India.

- We also have undertaken sanitation project supported by World bank through the State of Uttarakhand. The programme indicates for Uttarakhand Rural Water Supply and Sanitation Project.
- We have worked on AIDS and HIV intervention in association Uttarakhand State AIDS Control Society Dehradun. Sanjeevani” has worked as a partner NGO in Bageshwar district exclusively on Female Sex Workers for 3 years.
- Sanjeevani has worked on tuberculosis awareness and testing of patients in partnership with RNTCP (Revised National Tuberculosis Control Programme) is the second largest national programme in the country.
- We have organized a Pre-Conception-Pre-Natal Diagnostic Techniques Workshop in Vikas Bhawan Hall, District Bageshwar in association with Garuda Advertisement Agency New Delhi for the district level workshop. The programme was funded and guided by Directorate of Health and Family Welfare, Uttarakhand Government.

Environment activities:

- Sanjeevani is the partner of Fair Climate Network Bangalore. Fair Climate Network stands for Carbon mitigation project across the country. And our organization has completed Ten thousand house hold survey for the purpose. For the same, Sanjeevani has registered our project from Gold Standard Foundation. In the first phase, we have initiated in the distribution of smokeless woodstove. This project will not only for carbon mitigation but it will also work as pro poor in the basis of carbon credit. We are connected with 1550 HHSs. In present ongoing project, every household is reducing 4.19 Ton carbon per annum.
- Our organization is a partner organization of CASA. And organization has executed Climate change campaign and Panchyats election campaign with CASA in association of Mountain Collective Forum.
- Our organization has executed Participatory Rural Appraisal (PRA) in three gram panchayat in Bageshwar under the DFO Office/Member Secretary, IWMP Bageshwar. We have been working on Watershed management program in the hill regions.

Working with Children and Women:

- Sanjeevani runs child helpline in collaboration with Child line India Foundation. We are working in the entire districts for child rights and child protection.
- Sanjeevani has formed Self Help Groups (SHGs) for women. We have nearly about 250 SHGs.



Project Activities 2020-21



1. COVID-19 RESPONSE



1. Ration Support with the help of The Donkey Sanctuary's

As part of project collaboration in support of Covid 19 emergency support, we have distributed ration to the mule owners and their families in project regions. We identified 500 families (mule owners and marginalized communities) who faced difficult times to get their rations during these pandemic times. Every month, we identified the new mule owners as part of field visits who are living in poor condition and far from the towns to get their basic necessities. We created the database of all the 500 families who received ration support during this Covid pandemic. We filled all the rations and travelled to the remote villages and distributed the rations. First, we identified them during our field visit and found the needy people and particularly mule owners and their families status. Later on, we worked on the distribution of rations. Here are few photos of the mule owners who received the rations from TDS support.





2. Ration Support, Masks and Sanitizer with the help of CBM

In the CBM project location, during the first wave of COVID-19 pandemic not only Sanjeevani and its staff distributed sanitizers and masks to the persons with disabilities and other marginal section of society but also sanitized the house and common community places etc. The Master Trainer of this programme also prepared 4675 masks and distributed them for the

people. We also arrange 25 litre sanitisers for the poor section of society. We have installed Arogya Setu App in the smart phone of 319 persons. Our social workers met with the Tehsil administration to provide dry ration to disabled persons and other marginalized sections of the society, after which they received the sufficient rations support nearly for 5000 people.

3. Sanjeevani contribution to serve the needy during Covid-19:

Initial phase, the complete lockdown to curb the effect of COVID-19 has severely affected the survival of laborers in the rural villages. Since, there is no labor work, they neither had opportunity to earn money nor have they saved any for survival. Hence, they survived the first few days of lockdown but then faced problem in purchasing food items for daily use. Sanjeevani team decided to provide ration to those households from our contribution who are laborers and old age people living alone. Along with rations support, we also provided masks and sanitizers and distributed as per the number of households. Sanjeevani has helped around 1200 beneficiaries directly in our project regions. All our team members contributed their half of their salary to give our support towards needy people.



2. PRAISE II

(Livelihood Support for Disabled Person & Marginalized section of people)



Project Name: Promotion of Sustainable Livelihood in the Hills of Uttarakhand (PRAISE – II U.K. Cluster)

Project outreach : 475 villages in 4 Development Blocks (Chaukhutia, Syalde, Ukhimath & Chakrata) of Uttarakhand.

Direct Beneficiaries: 3800 (1300 persons with disabilities & 2500 vulnerable persons were directly benefited for their sustainable livelihood.

Indirect Beneficiaries: 11800 beneficiaries' family members of persons with disabilities and vulnerable persons.

Project Partner: The Hans Foundation and The CBM India Trust

Project Intervention and its success:

Sanjeevani has partnered with The CBM India Trust for undertaking a project which is funded by The Hans FOUNDATION for persons with disabilities & marginal persons to improve the quality of life of persons with disabilities through inclusive development in Uttarakhand by 2024.

Based on the project objectives and goals, the project implementation was initiated in the field. Sanjeevani has started with the baseline survey of new clients i.e., 112 persons with disabilities which were after included in the existing CBIGs which were formed in the PRAISE – I. Under the skill

development training programme new stakeholders have been trained on the different traits of vegetable cultivation such as commercial vegetable cultivation, land preparation, composting, seeds, nursery raising etc. To capacitate 4 DPOs, we have conducted 4 leadership skill and advocacy workshop. It has resulted into that now DPOs are able to conduct their own Block level quarterly meeting where they invited the organizational field staff.

For the sustainability and smooth functioning of FPOs 5 Capacity Building workshops on FPO business plan and legal compliances of FPOs Board of Directors were organized by NIDHI Sanstha. With the assistance of Horticulture Dept. and Social Welfare Dept. we also conducted 2 Training and Linkage with PRIs in each development block. The main focus of the training is to aware persons with disabilities about the various departmental schemes, seeds, medicines, progressive farmer awards, widow pension, old age pension, UDID card schemes for etc. PMIC with DDM, NABARD, Almora also conducted. International Disability Day was also celebrated on 3rd Dec. as part of supporting inclusive development.

Sanjeevani along with its partners found that persons with disabilities have facing some difficulties on farm work with their traditional agri-tools. We and our partners prepared 18 prototypes of agri-tools and equipments for their convenience on the field. Under the Livelihood Basket Assessment 408 persons with disabilities received their trainings and 112 new stakeholders' business plans were also made. 157 persons with disabilities and 468 marginal sections of persons of PRAISE - I phase also received their Refresher Training under farm activities. The network meetings with Agri-Horticulture department have resulted into 12 poly houses Disability Inclusive demonstrative unit. In current scenario, 4 Farmers Producer Organisation have 419 farm shareholders. There is total 138 persons with disabilities & 281 marginal section of persons in these FPOs.

Due to COVID -19 pandemic and imposed lockdown work has suffered also but we at Sanjeevani keep in touch with their stake holders. We have followed up the work and challenges faced of 217 non-farm stakeholders with disabilities& 220 farm clients with disabilities. Some of them faced a big challenge. Everyone's livelihood was affected. Sudden stoppage of the project as well as the imposed lockdown had created problems for everyone. Farmers were not able to go on the field, due to which their crops suffered naturally. Sanjeevani field workers went to the field and through video chat, solved the problem of farmers by the agricultural experts of the Organization. With such help they were able to stop the loss at the right time and increase their income level. The same mechanism was applied for farming and non farming clients with disabilities also. The success of the project is visible and now the established 4 Disabled People Organization and 410 persons with disabilities successfully run their FPOs.

Success Stories of the Project

Success Story 1:

Name: Pooran Singh

Location: Village- Kanrain, PO- Masi,
Block- Chaukhutiya, Almora, Uttarakhand



Pooran Singh was born in 1982 with hearing and speech disabilities. His parents were not aware of his condition when he was born but by and by, they started observing it when he did not respond to sounds. They consulted a doctor who confirmed their fear. It was a bolt from the blue for Diwan Singh and his wife. Diwan Singh became despondent but his wife didn't lose her heart. She insisted on providing basic education to her son. Despite numerous odds, Pooran Singh could complete middle school and learnt a way to communicate through writing. The family was dependent on farming so the income was not enough to take care of family needs as well as Pooran's treatment. When he was 32 years old, he got married to Hema Devi who was also speech impaired. With the passage of time his family grew along with his responsibilities. After marriage both husband and wife got disability certificate and Divyang pension. This pension became main source of their income as the output from the land was enough only for their daily needs. In 2017, The Hans Foundation initiated PRAISE UK, a program for community-based rehabilitation of PwDs, in partnership with CBM Trust. Sanjeevani, which was implementing partner, approached all PwDs in the project area. This brought them in contact with Pooran, who showed enthusiasm in project's activities. Sanjeevani also responded in like manner by offering him training on tailoring. He received a three months training from a local named Nirmala Devi. After this training he worked as an apprentice in A-One tailoring shop where he got hands on skills. After this he started working from home. Sanjeevani motivated him to partner with Gauri Shankar, who is also one of the beneficiaries of PRAISE UK project. Together they rented a shop in Chaukhutiya and purchased an interlocking machine. Sanjeevani provided them two sewing machines. This enterprise helped Pooran in ensuring additional average income of Rs Seven Thousand per month. Diwan Singh is now satisfied that his son is successfully taking care of his family and respected by the community. In addition to this Pooran has purchased one buffalo and grows vegetables for which training was provided by Sanjeevani. This is not all as his social life is also leveraged. He participates actively in the activities of Community Based Inclusive Group (CBIG), a self-help group formed under this project. He believes his social standing has improved and the exclusion which he faced before this is now

gone. Now his family is socially integrated and economically secure. Building-up on hope.

Success Story: 2:

Name: Ranjeet Singh

**Location: Village- Bistrakhet, Block-
Syaldeh, District- Almora**

Ranjit Singh is married to Suri Devi and has three sons. While he was working in a Paper Mill in Saharanpur, he suffered a stroke of luck which changed his life completely. He met with an accident which completely paralysed his right arm. Though the treatment cost was covered by his company, he lost his job. The company also provided him some compensation. He was just 10th pass and did not have any technical education but he was a quick learner and lot of capabilities. He believes that if he had not met with accident, he would have been production manager in the factory by now. He was married for only six months when this incident happened. His wife stood like a rock during this time and supported him during these depressing times. Due to this he considered his wife as his inspiration. He also faced mental stress when some people in the community commented on his physical conditions. However, he tried not to get swayed by the opinion of others. The accident could not break his resolve. As someone has rightly said “most of the important things in the world have been accomplished by people who have kept on trying when there seemed to be no hope at all”. He took it as a challenge and made efforts to bring his life back on track. Since he lost his right hand, he started using the left one. Back in his village, he understood that multiple livelihood options were required for meeting the needs of his family. He joined a hydel project as a field staff for recording meter readings. By this job he earned Rs.10,000 as salary. He also started working as an electrician and started a business of making online payments of bills for other people. He purchased a machine costing Rs.6000 for this purpose which made this task easier. He had some agricultural land where he started growing spices. His three sons also inherited his zeal and progressed quite well in their studies as well as in other fields. One of his sons is pursuing a polytechnic degree whereas another one is enrolled in a computer course. His third son is working in Delhi. The two sons who are studying are also earning through part-time jobs like videographer and astrologer. Ranjeet Singh’s life story and energy impressed Sanjeevani which was implementing the PRAISE UK project of The Hans foundation and CBM India Trust in his village. It identified him as an inspirational and motivational speaker and used him for motivating other persons with disabilities (PwDs). A



training on public speaking, imparted by Sanjeevani, resulted in a drastic change in his life. In addition to this he was provided with various platforms like workshops and community event where he could sharpen this skill. All this made him a good motivator and trainer. As a result, he was able to form various community based inclusive groups (CBIGs). Sanjeevani also provided him training on beekeeping and made him a master trainer for this occupation. As a master trainer he trained 60 PwDs on beekeeping. He himself took it as an occupation which added to his income. He supports other PwDs with his own resources without any charge by helping them in accessing their entitlements like bus passes Divyang pensions et cetera. Now, he is known for his kind heart and people respects him for his activities in his village and neighboring villages as well.





3. Animal Welfare

Project Name: Animal welfare and Equine care

Project outreach: 255 villages, 9 blocks in Almora district, Uttarakhand.

Direct Beneficiaries: 505 Equine owners for Azolla production and Ration distribution.

Indirect Beneficiaries: 2358 family members

Total Equines covered: 1274 equines are supported.

Donor: The Donkey Sanctuary's (UK)

Project Intervention and its success:

Sanjeevani has partnered with The Donkey Sanctuary's organization for undertaking a project for Covid-19 Emergency Relief Fund (CERF) in support mule care and their families through promoting azolla cultivation as alternative fodder for mules and also support the families with the supply for rations. Based on the project objectives and goals, the project implementation was initiated in the field. Sanjeevani has carried



out the project activities in February such as conducting baseline survey of all 500 equine owners, group formation of owners for activities such as azolla cultivation and network meeting with the local veterinary hospitals, trainings on azolla cultivation and a network meeting with local veterinary hospital were also conducted.



As part of project intervention, we were able to reach out direct beneficiaries of 505 equine owners for ration supply, total equines covered are 1274. 100 mule owners are direct beneficiaries who received training for Azolla unit; we shall be supply the start of Azolla beds. The indirect beneficiaries are family members of equine owners and total coverage of indirect beneficiary could be around 2358.

Due to Covid 19, and lockdown, the equine owners were struggling to purchase ration for their families and hence purchasing fodder for equines was extremely difficult. The equine owners were given ration supply from the project which enabled them to purchase fodder and required medicine for their equine.

Promotion and cultivation of Azolla as alternate nutritious fodder for equines catered the problem of fodder scarcity and ensured better health of equines. The intervention not only contributed to better health of equines but also opened income opportunity for the owner by selling azolla to other animal owners. This initiative has brought create awareness among the mule owners and they are keen in production of Azolla and feed their animals. They have given trainings of Azolla cultivation, and we are in process of setting Azolla beds for each beneficiary.



The network meetings with veterinary department has resulted in creating awareness among the equine owners' community regarding health facilities provided by the government veterinary hospitals for free or at subsidized rates. The owners were informed about various diseases, treatment, medicines and improving living conditions. The owners could relate to the health issues of their equines and became sympathetic towards their equine.



The roles and responsibilities of the beneficiaries are to encourage them to participate in all intervention and particularly in Azolla training, and network meeting with local veterinary hospitals. Further, the beneficiaries should put their effort for the linking the government schemes through networked hospitals and avail their services. Regarding Azolla unit, they should cultivate, produce the Azolla, and feed the animals (mules) to see the differences in their health and

stamina. This should enable to build more Azolla unit for large production with their own contribution.

Success Stories of the Project

Success story: 1:

Name : Nandan Singh
Block : Syalde
Age : 44 years
Family : Mother, wife and two children
Equines : 3 Horses

Agriculture and animal husbandry are the sources of income for the family. Pandemic has severely affected Nandan's family income where there are no any works or labour job is available. Fodder availability for the equines reduced drastically and resulted in death of one horse last year. The family was struggling through these crisis situations when Sanjeevani introduced them 'The Donkey Sanctuary' Project. It was ray of hope for the family with support of rations during this pandemic time. The family also received trainings and also information on Azolla as alternative fodder production support. The family felt as essential component to support their equines stamina and also support their livelihood indirectly. During, the network meeting with Doctors of Veterinary Hospital enlightened them about Insurance benefits and Azolla trainings solved the problem of fodder shortage. A self-help group was formed by the team through which Insurance of three horses has been done. The untimely loss of one equine is equivalent of loss of a family member. Hence, Sanjeevani team motivated the equine owners to secure their equines in order

to minimize their losses at the time of crisis. Their family is actively participating in the entire works of project and particularly has prepared the Azolla beds where they would start cultivating the Azolla soon and feed their equines.

Success Story: 2:

Name : Baspanand
Block : Syalde
Age : 34 years
Family : Mother, wife and two children

Prior to the outbreak of CORONA Virus, Baspanand was working in a company in Delhi. The family's expenses were being managed by the cumulative income of family from agriculture and some financial support was given by Baspanand from Delhi. He used to labour work in the town to support his family livelihood. Hence, the financial condition of family as a whole was moderate and normal. However, the outbreak of CORONA virus followed by lockdown forced Baspanand to return to his village. He waited for several months in the villages. Later, the company also informed him that they have closed all their projects and asked him to stay back. And there was no any local labour job available for him to sustain their income.

After struggling for work and money and consultation from friends and family, he decided to purchase a horse. Things got better as various types of work such as marriages, construction and material supply resumed. He started earning from this single horse. Meanwhile he got introduced to 'The Donkey Sanctuary Project' and was given information regarding survival of equines, their diet patterns, health issues and remedies. Owing to good income, he bought one more horse. Since he is an active member of a self-help group formed by the project team, he has done insurance of both his equines and has secured them for a long time.





4. Gram Seva (Integrated Rural Development)

Project Name: SBI Gram Seva (Holistic Rural Development through the adoption of Gram Panchayat)

Project outreach: 5 villages, Nail Gram Panchayat, Block Syalde, in Almora district, Uttarakhand.

Direct Beneficiaries: 750 families covering 5 villages.

Indirect Beneficiaries: The entire community and also adjoining villages.

Donor: State Bank of India Foundation

Project Intervention and its success:

SBI Gram Seva was launched in October 2017 as a flagship program in 6 states by SBI Foundation Mumbai. Sanjeevani implemented the project in Gram Panchayat Nail comprising of five villages in Almora District. The project was successfully completed on September 2020.

The phase experienced a major setback due to the outbreak of COVID-19 pandemic in terms of implementation of various activities and organizing community awareness programs, health camps, financial and digital literacy camps. However,



sustainability of the project was ensured during the phase by conducting various meetings and workshops with the community.



Five villages in Almora District have realized that, SBI Gram Seva, an initiative of CSR is the key to holistic development of villages. These villages proved to be different from other villages in terms of attaining education through smart, remedial and computer classes, a better environment, development of old infrastructure, renovation of local dispensary along with establishment of Baby delivery enter, sustainable livelihood with skill development, achieving the pride of 'Open Defecation Free' Gram Panchayat,

availability and accessibility of Safe Drinking Water and many other benefits.

The five villages (Nail, Malli Bakhali, Thadidhar, Gagnaula and Jairaj) faced similar issues as most of the villages in hilly region such as lack of livelihood opportunities, migration of youth to big cities, less income in agricultural sector, non- accessibility of market, etc. In addition, the Gram Panchayat Nail is located in a remote area of Syalde Block which restricts percolation of government schemes and banking services to the community. Commutation (lack of public transport) is one of the major reasons for the poor development of the Gram Panchayat.

The primary interventions of the program included renovation of an existing building for a Community Information Centre (CIC) with internet facilities in all five villages, setting up remedial and computer classes for the kids and providing information regarding various government schemes and services. Considering the education skills of the rural students, SBI Foundation provided financial support to outstanding students in the field of cultural, academics and sports for their brighter future.

As the result of Community Awareness Programs organized under the program, communities become aware regarding their environment and planted 20,349 trees including local species and various fruit plants. Water conservation activities such as digging ponds and trenches along with tree plantation resulted in rejuvenation of their existing drinking water sources. Regular informative interactions with the community resulted in demand of compost pits and rainwater harvesting tanks at household level. The program team realized in the monthly meetings with the community that scarcity of drinking water is a common issue in all five villages. Hence, renovation of existing water supply schemes was done along with installing new water lines to increase the

accessibility and amount of drinking water. The intervention has also reduced women drudgery as otherwise they had to walk far to fetch water.

The setback of farming in mountains is the issue of wild menace, destruction of crops by wild animals. SBI Gram Seva program has minimized the grief of farmers by providing fencing wire bundles to groups of farmers having consolidated fields. The crop yield has increased 2 to 3 times due to the intervention and motivated farmers towards vegetable cultivation. Skill development trainings on tailoring, dairy, poultry, beekeeping, dairy, goat rearing and food processing have widened the scope of livelihood among the community. Initially, farming was the only source of livelihood in the area but at present a wide range of livelihood has enabled the community to raise their income. The beneficiaries have received 'Mudra loan' for expansion of their trade with the support of SBI Regional Office in Almora, SBI Syalde Branch, SBI Foundation in Mumbai and Sanjeevani in Ranikhet. The program has also facilitated opening of two Customer Service Points (CSPs) in Nail Gram Panchayat making it possible for villagers to avail bank services which otherwise was hardly possible. The project has focused on convergence with the line departments and bank officials considering sustainability and benefits to community on large scale. Hence, two polyhouses worth Rs. 1 lakh each has been benefitted on 80% subsidy, farm equipment such as power weeder, chaff cutter and water pipes and water pumps have been provided to the community members as a result of network meetings with the officials. The major contribution of SBI officials in the project area has been inauguration of Customer Service Points for the convenience of villagers, providing mudra loans for motivating business set ups and conducting financial literacy camps for creating awareness regarding various social benefit schemes.

PRERNA- SBI Stitching Training Centre has also been inaugurated under the Gram Seva Program in Nail Gram Panchayat for people to receive training in stitching.

SBI Gram Seva Program has contributed in renovating connecting paths in villages, constructing and repairing public bathrooms for women, constructing irrigation tanks and large cemented dustbins for dry waste. It was only due to the program that villagers could avail government schemes and services such as agricultural equipments, social benefits, health insurance, soil health cards, seeds and organic fertilizers and many others. All these interventions have resulted in the convenience and benefit of the community.



5. Climate Change (Smokeless Stoves for Carbon Mitigation)



Project Name: Climate Change (Smokeless Stoves – Carbon Mitigation)

Project outreach: Almora district, Uttarakhand.

Direct Beneficiaries: 1550 end users.

Donor: Fair Climate Network Bangalore and Integra Micro Systems (P) Ltd

Project Intervention and its success:

Sanjeevani is a partner of Fair Climate Network Bangalore. Fair Climate Network stands for Carbon mitigation project across the country. Sanjeevani has been a partner of this network from 2013. And our organization has completed Ten thousand house hold survey for the purpose. There are three organizations from Uttarakhand for the purpose and we have registered our project from Gold Standard Foundation. In the first phase, along with the support of Integra Micro Systems (P) Ltd, we have distributed smokeless woodstoves in the villages. This project will not only for carbon mitigation but it will also work as pro poor in the basis of carbon credit. We have distributed 2046 smart stoves and 2 Jumbo stoves to 1550 End User women in 56 villages.

The selected women Village Monitor regularly visits households and strictly monitors usage using the Woodstoves. This year too our caseworkers' organised village level meetings and review the status of the project. But the quantity is very low due to the COVID-19 lockdown. The query of end user resolves at their level. In present ongoing project, every household is reducing 4.19 tonne carbon per annum.

6. Children Development



Project Name: Child HelpLine India – 1098

Project outreach: Almora district, Uttarakhand.

Direct Beneficiaries: Children below 18 years of age.

Indirect Beneficiaries: Awareness in the community and families of children.

Donor: Childline India Foundation (Ministry of Women and Child Welfare Department, New Delhi)

Project Intervention and its success:

Sanjeevani has been working in the programme as a 'Collaborative Organisation' in Almora district of Uttarakhand. Sanjeevani shall function as the call centers for CHILDLINE. Sanjeevani has been working 24 hour and respond to calls that are received on the 1098 CHILDLINE service. The collaborative organization is provided with a center coordinator who manages a team of 8 persons that respond to calls and intervene in emergency cases.

Based on the project objectives and goals, the project implementation was initiated in the field. Sanjeevani has started with outreach activities and successfully completed 22 numbers which were conducted on monthly basis where community has to be sensitized about the importance of Childline Helpline 1098 with a live demo session. It has resulted in 722 numbers of cases received and 12 FIRs lodged.



Only genuine cases were followed up by the Childline. We also have identified 80 children which have lost their earning parents during the COVID-19 pandemic under Mukhmantri Vatshalya Yojna. Each child which is under 18 years will receive the amount of INR 3000 per month in their bank account till the age of 21 years. 12 open house programmes also organised this year. These programmes are those

programmes where our outreach has been more than 3 times. Problem listening, resolving and to aware more about the Rights of the children under 18 years are one of the main traits of these programmes.

In this year we have also done 4 community engagement activities. The help of task force (Police, CWC, DLSA are the members of this society) is required in community engagement activities like child labour cases etc. For the smoothening of the programme we also have conducted 48 weekly staff meeting and 12 coordinators meetings in all.

8 Awareness programmes also run this year where other people or children have to be aware about their rights and the importance of CHILDLINE Helpline 1098. Such awareness programme has conducted in public trade fairs, school etc.

Being a member of the Childline Advisory Board where District Magistrate, Senior Officers from other departments are the other members participated in review meeting which is conducted every quarter in a year. The purpose of the meeting is to get to know about the progress and the challenges faced by CHILDLINE during the programme have to be resolved.

7. Oak Tasar

Project Name: Oak Tasar

Project outreach: Kapkot, Garud & Bageshwar, District – Bageshwar of Uttarakhand.

Direct Beneficiaries: 325 Individuals.

Indirect Beneficiaries: 510 families covering awareness in 50 to 70 villages.

Donor: Board of Silk Control

Project Intervention and its success:

Sanjeevani has partnered with The Department of Sericulture, Dehradun, and Uttarakhand for the cocoon production with 350 OBC beneficiaries of Development Block Kapkot of District Bageshwar.

Oak Tasar is an agro based rural cottage industry where wild silk produced by the silkworm *Antheriaproccilii* on various species of oak plant in the sub-Himalayan region of India from Northwest to Northeast. During these 45-50 days process each family normally earns 5000–20000 per month with very low cost.

The oak plant forest wealth spread over an area of about 3.50 lakh hectares in Uttarakhand is a major source of livelihood for the residents of the area by rearing oak tasar silkworm. Oak taser silk industry involves in various techniques like planting and maintenance of oak plants, silkworm seed

production, silkworm rearing and post-harvest techniques like threading and weaving of cloth etc.



The first work implemented by Sanjeevani is the selection of beneficiary according to the standards set by the central government. This programme is executing in Kapkot block with 325 beneficiaries of 14gram panchayats.

As the program run, Sanjeevani has completed the 43 insects foster house so far. The rearing work has been done by the beneficiaries in these insects foster house. During 1st phase of COVID-19 pandemic Sanjeevani has taken permission from the local administration in the month of April-May to resume the rearing work which was done by the beneficiaries. Total 7 beneficiaries of 4gram panchayats has produced 47,500 cocoons and earned the amount of INR 75,000 by selling INR 37,500 cocoons.

With the help of team Sanjeevani our beneficiaries established 2 nurseries in this financial year. These nurseries have been established in 2 acres where about 52,500 saplings of Manipuri Oak have been planted. The nursery is related to plantation during rainy season and winter season. The main objectives of this programme are to plant Manipuri oak, creating Disease Free Layings (DFL). DFL is a stage where eggs can be produced by the silkworm, due to which the life of silk worm can go on smoothly. Graining is also the objective of the programme. Granage rooms are the rooms where the eggs are produced by the coupling of male and female insect.

Sanjeevani planted 1,23,200 Manipuri oak plants in 70 hectares. All these complete arrangements for the above 1,23,200 Manipuri oak through his own medium. Sanjeevani also conducted time to time various training programmes for the beneficiaries. In continuation this, we have conducted various trainings on nursery raising, afforestation, insect rearing, plantation etc. in 14 villages for the 300 beneficiaries. In these training programmes Resource Person were the technical assistants from the silk department and scientists from the Bhimtal.



Sanjeevani also distributed 165 insect rearing materials to the beneficiaries, after which 1,00,000 silk cells were produced and beneficiaries earned an income of Rs. 1,25,000 from the insect rearing. To make rearing successful, insecticides (lime, bleaching powder etc.) were also distributed to the beneficiaries. To learn the subtleties of silk, Sanjeevani Team along with the beneficiaries participated in Resham Krishi Mela, Bhimtal during the year.

Activity: Oak Tasar Silkworm rearing

Dham Singh is a resident of Guler Gram Panchayat. He is one of the beneficiaries who carried out their work successfully even during the COVID-19 pandemic. With the help of Sanjeevani and the sufficient availability of Oak Tasar he started his work of rearing silkworms. He gives right time to his work. He takes care of the cleanliness regularly because it essential for the cocoons. The process of making cocoons takes 45-50 days. Dham Singh personally prepared 6000 cocoons which were sent by Sanjeevani to the local research center, Bhimtal, where he made the seeds. After selling these cocoons, Dham Singh earned Rs.8000.


